DELIVERABLES

- ► Environmental scan of international initiatives
- Overlap studies to determine scale/range of Canadian print collections
- ▶ Public registry of commitments to hold/preserve materials
- ► Proposal to build national network of distributed and/or central facility-based preservation
- Recommendations for post-project operationalization of strategy

PROJECT FOCUS & SCOPE

- ► Many discussions about focus for first phase project
- ► Alternating moments of clarity and mass confusion about current focus and future work of our group
- ► Canadian Federal Government Publications *to start* followed by:
 - ► Canadian imprints & materials about Canada
 - ► Potential cooperation on any/all print materials

National Overlap Study (NOS)

- ► LAC Funded project working with OCLC (SCS)
 - ▶ 26 Partner Libraries
- ▶ Goals
 - Identify federal government documents from 26 participating libraries
 - Quantify overlap and identify last copies to support print preservation initiatives
- Scope
 - Print monographs and serials
 - ► Bibliographic and holdings data is from WorldCat

National Overlap Study (NOS) Findings

- Results of Overlap Analysis
 - ▶ 26 libraries with 33 holding symbols
 - ~18M distinct titles (OCLC number) = 39M title-holdings
 - ► Total of 748,000 titles (monographs and serials) have been identified as Canadian Federal publications
 - ▶ High number of titles (over 500,000) are uniquely held
- ► Each Library's holdings identified and isolated in Green Glass
- ► Refining Data Clean Up
 - Consultation with participating libraries

CCPSWG Working Groups

- Working in parallel to NOS
 - ► Retention & Access
 - Communications
 - Governance
- ► Charged with developing proposals to build the network

Challenges

- Retention Model and Commitments
 - Number of copies to retain
 - ▶ What does access look like?
 - ▶ What is LAC's role?
 - Overlapping retention commitments
- Governance and Costs
 - What type of organization is needed to make this project a success?
 - Who will pay and how would a network be funded?
- Role of retention/preservation balanced against use and digitization

Next Steps

- Consulting with NOS participants on retention framework and commitments
- ► Fine tune proposals for retention schema and models
- ► Further discussion/engagement on Governance Model
- Communications plans
- Possible extension to CCPSWG mandate
