Unlike with videos or washing machines, in 1996, Amazon.com could easily offer "1 million" books online because highly structured, standardised, metadata - complete with a persistent and unique identifier, the ISBN, - was READILY AVAILABLE.


No, it would have been easier to herd kittens





Bezos needs to thank Irish statistician Gordon Foster and bookseller @WHSmith.

In 1965, the latter commissioned the former to create a Standard Book Numbering system for all books sold in standard.





To understand why this was needed, you need to know that in 1960s each publisher used THEIR OWN book numbering system - aka a NIGHTMARE for booksellers like W.H. Smith Imagine having to FIND the right edition of 'Black Beauty' without an industry-wide identifier system?






Impressed, in 1968 David Whitaker, a publisher of book listings, and R R Bowker added 'I'-for-international to SBN.

In 1972, ISO adopted ISBNs as a global standard.

Now you could FIND your favourite version of Black Beauty \*\*, with confidence, anywhere in the world!

Areas where quickly FINDING policy ideas, successes & failures so they can be easily SHARED and COMPARED might be beneficial.






After all, that's what happens in laboratories and universities the world over.

Standardised citations & links make it easy to FIND and CITE documents - wherever they originated.






Talking of citations, Michelle Lake told us that Gov Docs share of citations is falling  $\widehat{\mathbf{Q}}$ .

Helene LeBlanc thought that might be because journal articles are 'low-hanging fruit', i.e. they're much easier to cite than Gov Docs.

I think she's right.






# **Toby Green uncovers hidden content** @TobyABGreen Why are BOOKS & JOURNALS easier to cite? Because METADATA.

Did you know that one of the main reasons papers are rejected is because of poor references?

Scholars know. So are they MORE or LESS likely to wrestle metadataless Gov Docs into their Reference Management System?
